AN ACT

CONCERNING A SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. Appropriation to the department of human services for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025. In Session Laws of Colorado 2025, section 2 of chapter 476, (SB 25-206), **amend** Part VIII as follows:

SECTION 3. Appropriation to the department of human services for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025. In Session Laws of Colorado 2025, amend section 32 (3) of chapter 230, (HB 25-1154), as follows:

Section 32. **Appropriation - adjustments to 2025 long bill.** (3) To implement this act, the reappropriated funds appropriation made in the annual general appropriation act for the 2025-26 state fiscal year to the department of human services for use by the Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind is decreased by \$3,413,703, AND THE RELATED FTE IS DECREASED BY 13.8 FTE. This appropriation is from reappropriated funds received from the department of regulatory agencies for use by the public utilities commission for the Colorado commission for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind cash fund.

SECTION 4. Appropriation to the department of human services for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025. In Session Laws of Colorado 2025, amend section 33 (3) introductory portion, (3)(a), and (5) introductory portion, of chapter 230, (HB 25-1154), as follows:

Section 33. **Appropriation.** (3) For the 2025-26 state fiscal year, \$4,958,625 is appropriated to the department of human services. This appropriation is from the Colorado division for the deaf, hard of hearing, and deafblind cash fund created in section 26-21-107 (1), C.R.S. To implement this act, the department may use this appropriation as follows:

(a) \$4,891,755 for the communication services for people with disabilities enterprise, which amount is based on an assumption that the enterprise will require an additional ~~3.0 FTE~~ 16.8 FTE; and

(5) For the 2025-26 state fiscal year, \$21,467 is appropriated to the department of revenue. This appropriation is from the prepaid ~~wireless trust~~ TELEPHONE DISABILITY ACCESS CHARGE cash fund created in section 40-17-104 (2)(e)(II), C.R.S. To implement this act, the department may use this appropriation as follows:

SECTION 5. Safety clause. The general assembly finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for the support and maintenance of the departments of the state and state institutions.
